


### Colossians 3: 12-15

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## Murphy


Our topic this term- Terrific Transport- has allowed us to go on many imaginative journeys and explore different modes of transport. We began the term by looking at trains and going on a 'train ride' around Standlake before catching a ride on a naughty bus. We took the naughty bus for a journey around the classroom where he got up to lots of mischief and we made some creative stories with super descriptive vocabulary.

After learning all about George Stephenson and his famous invention, The Rocket, we designed and made our very own modes of transport using junk modelling. We made space rockets, flying boats, floating helicopters with skis and many more creative vehicles! As The Rocket was a fast locomotive we decided to test different materials to see which material would make our trains travel further and faster. We tested everything from paper and light material to our winter coats and a bath mat and discovered some interesting results.



## Donaldson Class

In Donaldson class, we really enjoyed our key text this term – The Tin Forest. We wrote some amazing leaflets persuading people to visit the forest, along with a beautiful setting description of the creatures and plants that you would find there. Living Things has been our topic in Science and we have learnt about the 7 life processes, as well as how to construct a food chain. Our 50 Things challenge this term also got us thinking about the natural world around us. We were tasked with improving our local environment, so we decided to tidy up the playground by picking litter and leaves before planting some wildflower seeds that we will nurture in our classroom until the weather warms up. We can't wait for that!



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
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## Blake Class

Frozen Planet has been Blake Class's fabulous topic this term. We have compared Antarctica with the Arctic, researched animals that live in these regions and learned all about Sir Ernest Shackleton's attempts to reach the South Pole, focussing particularly on his leadership skills. We also made our own dioramas of a polar region. In Science we have classified materials into their states based on their properties, learned about the behaviour of particles in different states and carried out some exciting experiments about the water cycle.

We enjoyed our English lessons based on 'The Snow Queen' by Hans Christian Andersen; most of us loved acting out parts of the story. We wrote our own character descriptions about the Snow Queen and, thinking about Kai being whisked away by the evil queen, we also wrote a balanced argument on whether 'Children should be allowed to play outside without an adult'. In computing we learned about Stop Motion and had a go at creating our own series of still images to exhibit motion.



## Dahl Class

We have had a lovely term in Dahl class learning all about Frozen Planet. In English we have been writing narratives based on the Snow Queen and created our very own balanced argument about climate change. We had great fun debating with our classmates on given topics such as deforestation.



In science we have been learning about states of matter and carried out a variety of experiments. We even had a little dance and singalong to help us remember what happens in the water cycle! In Geography we have been locating the polar regions, looking at how animals are adapted to live in those cold conditions, as well as investigating the potential impact the melting of the polar ice caps would have on planet Earth. We learnt all about Ernest Shackleton's attempts to reach the South Pole and how his leadership skills were effective during his expeditions. This linked with DT nicely, as we were able to make explorer cookies! Not so sure on the taste though...



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
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## Morpurgo Class

What a fantastic term this has been in Morpurgo! Because our termly topic was Lands End to John O' Groats, we focused on the picture book 'Journey' by Aaron Becker to inspire our writing. We wrote the most creative and exciting narratives about part of the journey the character embarked on which we can relate back to our geography unit of 'a journey' across the U.K. I have been so impressed with the ambitious vocabulary and language features the children have been using in their work!

In maths, children have been consolidating their knowledge of equivalent fractions and have been applying it to subtract and develop problem solving skills. Children have thoroughly enjoyed art, where they have explored city and landscapes, creating perspective with lines and colour. In Science, we have learnt all about electricity and have planned and executed our own science experiments. In R.E, we have read and analysed the meaning of stories, particularly from The Guru Granth Sahib, the Sikh holy book, and how the messages can be enjoyed and applied by all. Geography has taken us all over the U.K where children have developed map-reading and compass skills.



## Shakespeare Class

Shakespeare Class have travelled from 'Lands End to John O' Groats' in this term's topic, as we have learnt about the regions, cities, land uses and topography of the UK. Our topic has also allowed us to learn how to navigate with a compass (mostly accurately!) and use an OS map to plan a walking route.

Aaron Becker's wonderful picture book *Journey* has inspired our flashback writing and newspaper reports, whilst in science we have been experimenting with circuits, culminating in planning, completing and evaluating our own investigations.

As always, Mrs. Abraham has inspired us in our artwork – our cityscape silhouettes were a particular favourite. Finally, in RE we have had many thought-provoking discussions around eternity and whether anything lasts forever.




